Introduction

Create a Wish List

It's time to dream big!

There's always room to scale back an idea later, and to mesh your vision with what's actually feasible within your project's budget and other constraints you may be facing.

Now is the time to make a wish list of everything you'd love to see. Make it as long and as comprehensive as you like, and leave no idea unexplored.

Of course, your wish list can vary greatly depending on what room or area you're remodeling. And each person will have his or her own wish list, too, which is why it's important to create yours from scratch, rather than using someone else's.

To get started, ask yourself what the biggest problem is with the existing room or space, or the number one reason you're remodeling in the first place. Then ask yourself how you would ideally like to use that room. What type of features will help get you to that end result? Envision your home and your lifestyle, not just in the immediate future, but also in five or 10 years. How will the project help you accomplish this?

Let's face it, your 25-point wish list may never be 100 percent completed. So, once you have your master wish list, it's time to prioritize it. Here's a simple way to break it down:

What's the number one, absolute, must-have for this project? There's no compromising for you on this.

What are the top three items that would really make you happy with the project's outcome?

What are the remaining wish list items that would be nice to have, but wouldn't necessarily be a deal breaker to go without?

Establish Your Budget

The part of the remodeling process that most people dread is the budget. How much is this project going to cost? What can you afford? Will your expectations match up with your budget?

The tricky part is that many homeowners underestimate how much their dream project is going to cost. That's why it's important to be realistic.

The main elements that impact your budget include:

The size and scope of your project.

The type of materials used.


Appliances, if necessary.

Find the Right Contractor for the Job

Research

Getting a direct referral or recommendation from a trusted friend, neighbor, or family member is always a smart idea. They'll be able to speak to not only the quality of the finished project, but also the process of working with that contractor, and how smoothly, or not, it went.

Interviews

Don't limit yourself to only looking online. Use that as a starting point to begin narrowing down the selection. From there, speak with and interview several different contractors. Here are a few questions you may want to ask:

Are they properly licensed and insured?

Do they have references they can provide?

How long have they been in business?

How many similar projects have they completed?

How many projects do they work on at once?

Will they be able to meet your budget and your deadline?

Do they work with employees or subcontractors?

How many people do they have available for each project?

What makes them stand out from the competition,

Overall, does a particular contractor seem like an upfront, honest individual you can trust with your project, your money, and your home?

Will you enjoy working with them, and do you think they have a good sense of what you're looking for and how they'll be able to accomplish it?

Estimates

Of course, you may wish to receive bids or estimates from several different contractors. You want to ensure that each bid deals with the exact same scope of work and specifications so you can directly and fairly compare them.

Some contractors may try to hide certain costs, or may fail to explain how they arrived at particular totals. So be sure to ask about anything you don't understand, and ensure you receive clear answers.

Conversely, estimates that seem too cheap, and a bit too good to be true, may end up being just that. The contractor could be cutting some corners with the quality of the project, the time he takes, and his craftsmanship, or the grade of materials he's using.

Keep in mind that the most expensive bid doesn't necessarily make it the "best" or "nicest."



Create Your Timeline

Different projects will require different amounts of time to complete. And there's more to it than simply getting the contractor into the house to get the job done.

That's why you have to consider both the amount of time the contractor will actually need to do the work in house, as well as the overall completion time of a project from start to finish, including hiring, planning, and other logistics.

It may take a while to interview and hire the right contractor for your job. And you may also have to wait until their schedule allows time for your project. High quality contractors can be booked weeks, or even months, in advance. But the right one is worth the wait.

You may have to wait to get certain permits, or specific materials may take some time to track down. And projects that require bringing in specialized contractors for electric work, plumbing, and so forth, tend to take more time, too.

Bottom line, work with your contractor to create a realistic timeline, and be sure to include plenty of room for those expected delays.

Additional Considerations

Many homeowners get caught off guard with some of the logistical considerations of a large home remodeling project. It's important to plan and prepare for these so that it doesn't happen to you.

You should make some necessary arrangements and consider how you'll deal with the project and the accessibility or livability of your home during the process. Here are a few factors to consider:

What hours of the day and days of the week will the contractor be in your home?

How does that fit into your work schedule, your kids' routines for school or homework, and the rest of your life?

Does your neighborhood have restrictions on when potentially noisy construction projects can be completed?

Do you have a pet left home alone? Will you be able to safely keep it there during the project?

These are just a few logistical concerns to keep in mind. Most contractors should be able to work around your schedule to suit your needs and your lifestyle. Like with all other factors, consider how that affects the project's completion date.
